

Lesson Plan

Title

Who's Who and What Do They Do?

Audience

Grades 5 - 11

Overview

To clarify the roles and responsibilities of the people involved in the parliamentary process after watching them in action at the B.C. Legislature.

Objectives

- To become familiar with the participants in B.C.'s parliamentary process and their roles.
- To use their knowledge about the players in Parliament to better understand how the whole process comes together and works as a unit.

Activities and Methods

- 1. As a class generate a list of people that the students saw in the House and write the list on the front board.
- 2. Hand out the Who's Who and What Do They Do? Clues Worksheet
- 3. Working in groups, try to match the list of people generated on the front board to the clues described in the Clues Worksheet.
- 4. Go over the Clues Worksheet together to ensure accuracy.

Extension Ideas

- 5. Assign or let the students' choose one of the roles to do further research.
- 6. Act out a Question Period with each student performing a role in the Legislature.

Preparation (by teacher and by students)

- 1. Students would have been given background information about the provincial Legislature and how government works in the province.
- 2. Students will have already participated in a field trip to the Parliament Buildings in Victoria, B.C., and taken a guided tour, as well as had seats in the public gallery to witness Question Period first-hand; OR students will be shown clips of Question Period from the website under *Discover Your Legislature* or clips of Question Period produced by Hansard in the archives on the website.

Duration of Activity

• 1-2 periods

• Describe the levels, responsibilities, and the election of government in Canada.
