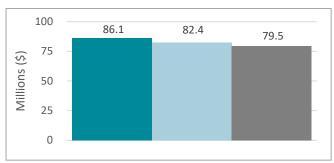

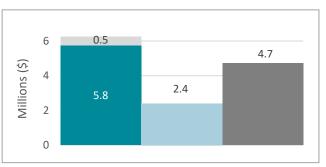
Operating Expenses - Total



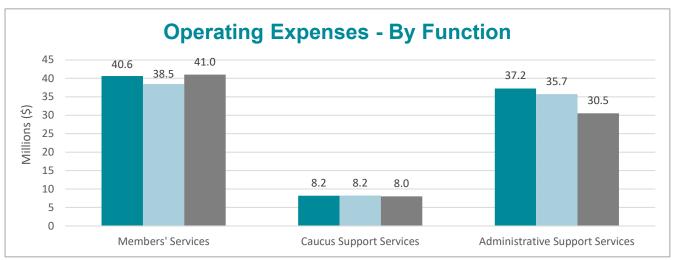


Capital Expenses - Total

Members' Services:

Savings of \$2.2 million due to lower MLA salary and benefit costs, unused transitional assistance and allowance costs, unused legal fees, reduced travel costs, and committee advertising.

Caucus Support Services:

The \$8.2 million Caucus Support Services budget was exceeded by \$50 thousand.

Administrative Support

Services: Savings of \$1.5 million due to temporary staff vacancies, unused contingencies and operational expenses; partially offset by increased professional services expenses.

Note 1: Savings in salary and benefit costs (\$823 thousand), information systems (\$51 thousand), MLA travel, transitional assistance and transitional allowance (\$573 thousand), and legal costs (\$157 thousand); partially offset by overspend in MLA stationery printing (\$32 thousand), and professional services (\$8 thousand) for MLA photo shoots and training.

Note 2: Savings in Member costs (\$263 thousand) related to CO allowances, leases, security, insurance, furniture and contingencies, lease consulting fees (\$12 thousand), internet costs (\$24 thousand); partially offset by overspend in salaries (\$12 thousand) related to retroactive pay attributed to non-returning Members, Constituency Assistant benefit charges (\$102 thousand) and Remembrance Day wreaths (\$11 thousand).

Note 3: Savings in salary and benefit costs (\$17 thousand), employee travel (\$13 thousand) and reduced operating expenses (\$10 thousand) due to COVID-19 with less opportunities to host seminars and presentations.

Note 4: Savings in employee (\$45 thousand) and Member (\$65 thousand) travel costs as well as office and business expenses (\$24 thousand) as a result of two consultations not proceeding and others being conducted virtually, less advertising (\$151 thousand) and professional services (\$61 thousand) than anticipated; partially offset by overspend in legal fees (\$9 thousand).

Note 5: Savings in employee (\$10 thousand) and Member (\$36 thousand) travel costs with events being cancelled or held virtually due to COVID-19 protocols, reduced office and business expenses (\$6 thousand) and professional services (\$24 thousand) for Indigenous consultant.

Note 6: Overspend in salary and benefit costs (\$317 thousand), partially offset by savings in operating expenses (\$293 thousand).

Note 7: Overspend in employee travel (\$18 thousand), operating expenses (\$377 thousand) related to unbudgeted contracts and costs of setting up new MLA offices; partially offset by savings in salaries and benefits (\$214 thousand) due to varying staffing levels and vacancies, building occupancy charges (\$113 thousand) with premises leased late in fiscal year and reduced legal fees (\$49 thousand).

Note 8: Overspend in salaries and benefits (\$21 thousand) and contractor fees (\$7 thousand); partially offset by savings in employee travel (\$12 thousand) and operating expenses (\$9 thousand).

Note 9: Contract terminated in September and additional funds were not required for workplace matters. A new contractor was utilized to provide respectful workplace training.

Note 10: Underspend in salary costs (\$96 thousand) due to staffing changes, professional services not required (\$20 thousand) and reduced operating expenses (\$44 thousand) due to COVID-19 protocols; partially offset by unbudgeted grant (\$5 thousand).

Note 11: Overspend in salaries and benefits (\$87 thousand) due to new Legal Counsel position approved mid-year by LAMC and vacation payouts; partially offset by savings in operating expenses (\$54 thousand) related to professional services, professional development and training, information systems and employee travel.

Note 12: Savings in salaries and benefits (\$89 thousand) due to underfilled FTEs and a temporary vacancy, employee travel (\$1 thousand), information systems (\$4 thousand) and office and business expenses (\$18 thousand).

Note 13: Lower than anticipated requirements for statutory publications for the Fall and Spring sessions. **Note 14:** Savings in salaries and benefits (\$49 thousand) due to temporary vacancies, professional services (\$26 thousand) as budgeted costs have been funded by other departments and an over accrual from FY21, information systems (\$4 thousand) and office and business expenses (\$14 thousand) for costs no longer expected to be incurred.

Note 15: Savings in salaries and benefits (\$87 thousand) due to vacant financial analyst position, and office and business expenses (\$19 thousand); partially offset by professional services overspend (\$8 thousand) for Enterprise Risk Management (ERM) consulting fees.

Note 16: Underspend in salaries and benefits (\$21 thousand), employee travel (\$1 thousand) and higher than anticipated dining room revenues (\$195 thousand) with the reduction of COVID-19 restrictions, partially offset by increase in supplies and food costs (\$76 thousand).

Note 17: Overspend in employee benefits (\$149 thousand) as a result of resignations at leadership level, professional services (\$42 thousand) for acting Director and CHRO contracts, and legal expenses (\$28 thousand); partially offset by savings in salaries (\$58 thousand) due to temporary vacancies, employee travel (\$11 thousand) and operating expenses (\$31 thousand) due to COVID-19.

Note 18: Additional unbudgeted professional service costs (\$1,676 thousand) related to agreement extensions, Microsoft support prepaid costs from FY21 and unplanned projects, and constituency office upgrade materials (\$6 thousand); partially offset by savings in salaries and benefits (\$133 thousand) due to temporary vacancies, employee travel (\$8 thousand), unavailable resources for electronic purchases and not renewing Microsoft Premium Support (\$905 thousand), business and office expenses (\$81 thousand) and contingency amounts set aside in General Centralized Expenses.

Note 19: Savings in salaries and benefits (\$94 thousand), employee travel (\$2 thousand), professional services (\$22 thousand), office and business costs (\$61 thousand) as a result of less hosting, and reduced advertising (\$4 thousand); partially offset by overspend (\$6 thousand) for a SharePoint online shopping cart solution and the purchase of an applicant tracking system in FY21 resulting in unanticipated costs for services that extended into the current fiscal year.

Note 20: Underspend in salary and benefit costs (\$24 thousand) due to vacancies and lower than anticipated operating expenses (\$66 thousand) due to fire alarm upgrade being classified as a capital project, and increased revenue (\$1 thousand) in facility rentals.

Note 21: Underspend for salaries (\$1,523 thousand) related to unused contingencies, including savings from the staff compensation review project funding, set aside to offset unbudgeted costs in other departments; savings in office and business expenses (\$4 thousand), building occupancy charges (\$37 thousand); unused grants (\$20 thousand). Partially offset by year-end retirement allowance and leave adjustments (\$90 thousand), overspend in amortization expense (\$306 thousand), professional services (\$28 thousand) related to the internal audit. ERP and procurement, and unexpected legal costs (\$97 thousand).

Note 22: Underspend in salary and benefit costs (\$116 thousand) due to a temporary vacancy, professional services (\$499 thousand) as a result of consultant availability shortage resulting in delayed projects, and information systems costs (\$6 thousand); partially offset by unanticipated advertising (\$15 thousand) and reclassification of the chimney deconstruction from capital to operating expenses (\$223 thousand).

Note 23: Savings in salary and benefit costs (\$67 thousand) due to temporary vacancy, office expenses (\$2 thousand) and professional services (\$115 thousand) with the Electronic Records Management System (ERMS) implementation delayed to next fiscal year.

Note 24: Overspend (\$569 thousand) related to invoice from the Victoria Police Department for overtime costs from 2021 and 2022 demonstrations; partially offset by salaries and benefits underspend (\$313 thousand) due to temporary vacancies including the Sergeant-at-Arms position, and reduction in operating costs (\$42 thousand).

Note 25: Overspend in salaries and benefits (\$502 thousand) due to increased committee activity, infrastructure support and overtime; partially offset by savings in operating expenses (\$78 thousand).

Note 26: Savings in salary and benefit costs (\$39 thousand) due to temporary vacancies, employee travel (\$8 thousand), and operating expenses (\$38 thousand).

Note 27: Savings represent funds for the purchase of office furniture that were not required.

Note 28: Variance results from: 1) underspend (\$2,632 thousand) in Capital Planning and Development related to reclassification of the chimney deconstruction, project delays resulting from staffing vacancies, contractor availability and supply chain challenges; 2) savings (\$649 thousand) in Information Technology related to the life cycle management project, network core switch replacement and constituency office network upgrades due to global supply chain delays; 3) underspend (\$60 thousand) in the Digital Information Office with the delayed implementation of the ERMS; 4) underspend in Legislative Facility Services for organization-wide office furniture and operating equipment (\$5 thousand), and Confederation Fountain lighting upgrade savings (\$4 thousand); 5) underspend (\$21 thousand) in Financial Services related to the vendor related accounting software upgrade delays; and 6) unused contingencies set aside in General Centralized Expenses (\$351 thousand) to offset purchases in other departments.

Note 29: Additional approvals form central contingencies for overbudget and/or unplanned projects (\$84 thousand); and underspend (\$25 thousand) resulting from unutilized funds for weapons due to purchase in prior fiscal year, and savings in project costs (\$32 thousand).

Note 30: Hansard Services underspend (\$163 thousand) due to delayed projects as a result of supply chain issues and lower than anticipated costs on completed projects.

Note 31: The purchase of the architectural documents cabinet was lower than anticipated (\$1 thousand) at time of budget, the digital archiving project (\$10 thousand) was cancelled and the book shelving for the vault (\$25 thousand) was deferred to next fiscal year.
