

LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

BRIEFING NOTE: QUARTER 4 FINANCIAL UPDATE - YEAR ENDED MARCH 31, 2023

PURPOSE

To present the Legislative Assembly Management Committee with an overview of the unaudited financial results for the year ended March 31, 2023.

DISCUSSION

The Legislative Assembly Administration is in the process of wrapping up the year end and preparing for the annual external audit of the financial statements later this summer. This report provides a preliminary overview of the results and variances from budget.

Throughout the year, the Legislative Assembly Administration has monitored the projected spend with an aim to reallocate funding to strategic priorities as inevitable underspend due to delays and vacancies impact the original plan.

Operating Summary

The unaudited results for the Legislative Assembly show as net underspend of \$4.6 million (5.1%) compared to budget. This is primarily due to a conservative approach to budgeting for the expenditures related to Members' Services. This budget is built on the assumption that all MLAs are entitled to and funded for the full amounts of any allowable expenses. Throughout the year, as the activities and constituency office (CO) operations vary between Members, not all the budget is required by every Member or CO. As a result, the budget has a built-in underspend which enables the Legislative Assembly's budget to have capacity to fund all required activities should they be required or requested. Appendix 1 shows a detailed breakdown of the various areas of operation.

Members' Services

Overall, as noted above, Members' Services is planned to have an annual underspend. For fiscal year 2022-23, this underspend was \$3.7 million (8.4%). Members' indemnities was the largest underspend primarily due to underutilization of the benefits component of this budget, the timing of committee appointments, as well as a positive variance in travel, supplies, and network costs.

The positive variance in Members' constituency support is due to a significant savings compared to budget in leasing and CO operating costs as well as wage and benefit savings resulting from vacancies.

The savings in Parliamentary Committees and Interparliamentary Relations directly relate to having fewer in person meetings and attendance at conferences which reduced the travel as well as staff costs.

Caucus Support Services

Overall, Caucus Support Services had an underspend of \$760 thousand (8.9%) compared to budget. This reflects a variance in the salaries and office operating costs in individual caucus operations. The overspend has been offset in the 2023-24 budget for the individual caucuses.

Legislative Assembly Administration

Overall, the Legislative Assembly Administration was \$172 thousand (0.04%) underspent for the fiscal year. Throughout the year, the Administration monitors the projected spend to reallocated available budget towards strategic priorities. For this report, the budget column does not reflect any additional funds allocated throughout the year which presents in many instances as an overspend. In all instances, this overspend and underspend were anticipated. Through the Budget and Forecast Review Committee and the Clerk's Leadership Group, the funds were reallocated from one area to another to maximize the use of the Administration budget and maintain momentum with projects and agility in responding to shifting service requirements.

Across the Administration, cost of living increases which were higher than originally budgeted accounted for overspend in wages. The significant overspend in Financial Services resulted from the costs associated with the leadership transition. The Parliamentary Dining Room was significantly busier than anticipated, however, staff shortages and increased food costs led to higher than anticipated expenses. The variance in Human Resources was a planned reallocation of funds to support the addition of staff and consulting expenses to start the Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) software system replacement project. The underspend in Capital Planning and Development is a due to increased vacancies which in turn contributed to the delay in the completion of several capital projects. These delayed capital projects then impacted the General Centralized Expenses by reducing the amortization costs.

These significant underspend amounts were part of the funds reallocated throughout the year. Lastly, the overspend in Hansard Services is due to higher than anticipated levels of activities compounded by increased wage rates resulting from the cost of living increases approved mid-year by the Legislative Assembly Management Committee.

Capital Summary

As reported throughout the fiscal year, limited staff resources combined with supply chain issues contributed to the significant underspend of \$4.475 million (47.2%) in the overall capital budget (Appendix 1). The small positive variances in Caucus Support Services reflect a budget for furniture that was not completely spent during the year.

The Sergeant-at-Arms underspend reflects the accumulation of savings across various projects such as replacement dispatch, mailroom x-ray, and other equipment. Within Legislative Assembly Administration capital budget, there are variances in furniture and equipment budgets, but the primary underspend relates to \$3.9 million in building projects which are underway but not completed in fiscal 2022-23. While all projects were impacted from staffing and supply chain challenges, this was most impactful in the building projects.

After a late start this past year, the life and safety projects in the main building got underway mid-year. The impact of this late start is that while the projects are now on track to be completed this fiscal. As staff

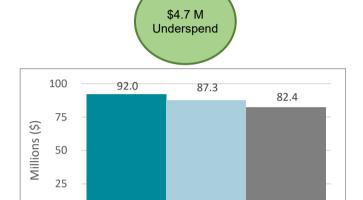
work through the first quarter, projects will be reviewed to determine the resourcing capacity and timing for the start and completion of the next series of capital projects.

For the period ending March 31, 2023 (Unaudited)



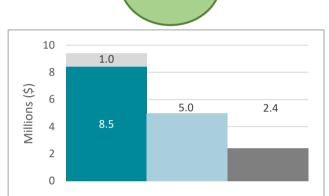
Operating Expenses - Total



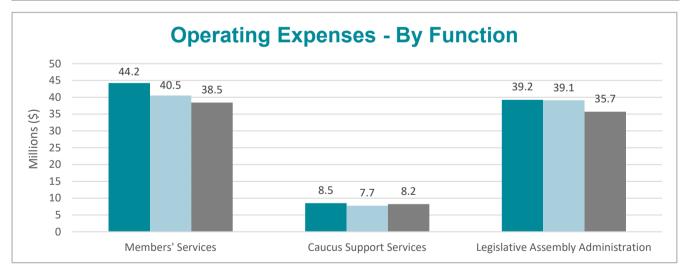
Capital Expenses - Total

Members' Services:

Savings of \$3.7 million (8.3%) due to anticipated underspend across the CO network. Budget assumptions include full spend for each CO office, travel and other expenditures.

Caucus Support Services:

The \$8.5 million (0.9%) Caucus Support Services budget was underspent by \$760 thousand.

Legislative Assembly Administration:

Overall underspend of only \$172 thousand (0.5%) resulted from of reallocation of funds mid year to recognize delayed projects and savings from vacancies. Mid-cycle reallocation included recognition of higher cost of living increases, additional Hansard activities, and additional IT projects.
