

# **Classroom Activity**

**Title:** Making Democratic Decisions → Consensus in Action!

#### Audience:

Grades 9 to 11 (MYP 3-5) Individuals & Societies / Social Studies students.

#### Overview:

Students explore how democratic decisions are made by experiencing the challenges of reaching consensus.

Through a playful simulation, they must agree on a single menu for a class "field trip."

This simple task helps them understand the complexity of collective decision-making and draw parallels with how the Government of British Columbia makes decisions that affect citizens.

# **Objectives:**

- Understand the difference between consensus and majority rule.
- Experience democratic collaboration through a practical group activity.
- Develop skills in negotiation, compromise, and respectful communication.
- Connect classroom experience to real democratic processes in British Columbia.

### **Activities and Method:**

#### Introduction (10 min):

Class discussion on democracy and collective decision-making. Present the "menu challenge" scenario.

# Phase $1 \rightarrow Pairs$ (10 min):

Each pair chooses a full menu (starter, main course, side, drink) and must reach full agreement.

#### Phase 2 $\rightarrow$ Groups of Four (10 min):

Two pairs merge and must agree on a new menu, practicing negotiation and compromise.

# Phase 3 → Whole Class (20 min):

Groups continue merging until one final class menu is reached. If there is no consensus, introduce **majority voting**.

#### Reflection (10 min):

Group debrief and short written reflection:

"Describe one difficulty your group faced in reaching consensus and how it reflects the challenges of democracy."

# Preparation (by teacher and by students)

#### Teacher:

Prepare large sheets or whiteboard space to record group menus.

Set timers for each phase.

Review concepts of "consensus" and "majority vote."

# Students:

Review basic ideas of democracy and decision-making.

Bring open-mindedness and willingness to collaborate.

### **Suggested Duration of Activity:**

1 hour total, but it could be less, depending on where you want to go in the process.

# **Suggested Learning Outcomes:**

#### **Core Competencies**

Communication: express and defend ideas respectfully.

Thinking: analyze challenges in decision-making and generate shared solutions.

Personal & Social: demonstrate empathy and cooperation within groups.

# **Social Studies Curricular Competencies**

Explain the role of institutions and citizens in democratic societies.

Analyze the impact of different decision-making processes on groups.

Reflect on civic responsibility and participation.

#### **Materials & Resources:**

Whiteboard or chart paper, markers or pens and a timer

Optional: visual comparing consensus vs. majority rule

# **Evaluation of activity:**

Formative: observation of participation, collaboration, and communication.

Summative (optional): short reflective writing linking the classroom activity to real

democratic processes in B.C.
