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Learning Activity: Show me the money!

Examining budgetary decisions, student values and party platforms.

Grade level / Big Idea:

Social Studies 10

The development of political institutions is influenced by economic, social, ideological, and geographic features.

Political Studies 11/12

Understanding how political decisions are made is critical to being an informed and engaged citizen.

Political institutions and ideology shape both the exercise of power and the nature of political outcomes

Provide a short description of the activity you want learners to engage in:

Students will examine budgetary decisions and documentation, and will recognize the political ideologies represented.

Essential questions:

- How does Party ideology impact budget priorities?
- What factors or criteria would you use to set budget priorities?

Curricular Competencies:

Social Studies 10: Use Social Studies inquiry processes and skills to ask questions; gather, interpret, and analyze ideas; and communicate findings and decisions.

Core Competencies:

Critical Thinking:

• Students establish an understanding of government priorities in budgeting and examine their own personal values with regards to the government's budget.

Social Responsibility:

• By examining consequences attached to budgetary decisions, students are given a deeper understanding of the responsibilities of government.

Communication:

• Students will justify their priorities regarding the budget and in doing so, communicate their personal values through their budgetary decisions.

Overview of the learning opportunity:

- 1. Start with household budget model: Planning Your Household Budget
 - a. Go over household budget with parents the night before and complete the Ongoing Expenses and Occasional Expenses forms. Students should discuss parents' justification for expenses and be ready to share the following with the class (keeping in mind that the details of family expenditures are a private matter):
 - i. What are your family's top priorities?
 - ii. What surprised you about your family's budget?
 - iii. What did you discover?
- 2. Provincial Budget: As an introduction to provincial budgets, show students the Video Clip.
- 3. Students will individually build a provincial budget pie chart based on their personal priorities.
- 4. Show BC Budget Expenditures Blank and have students use the word bank to predict what they believe the current government has as its priorities.
- 5. Show most recent budget and go over Government platform and see justification http://bcbudget.gov.bc.ca
- 6. In groups, students will look over Opposition Party platforms on each party's website and plan an appropriate budget. Groups will give an oral presentation using a pie chart and explain their assigned political party's priorities.
- 7. Students will vote for the party budget that best reflects the needs of British Columbians.

Suggestions for challenge-based or inquiry and cross-curricular integration

This lesson plan incorporates elements of SS 10, Political Studies 11/12 and Foundations of Math 11.

Learner self-reflection questions

- What did you learn about government financial processes?
- What were your considerations or difficulties in making your decisions?
- How accurately did your budget values align with the provincial parties?
- What surprises did you see in the provincial budget?
- What challenges did your mock caucus encounter?
